Important Informational Notice

for the Haitian Community in Florida's 20th Congressional
District Regarding the Recent Haitian TPS Supreme Court
Decision on June 25, 2026

Current as of July 1, 2026



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What Did the Supreme Court Decide?

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is allowed to continue the process of ending Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Haitian and Syrian nationals.

How Did the Supreme Court Arrive to this Ruling?

The Supreme Court ruled that the TPS statute generally places decisions to designate or terminate a country's TPS status within the discretion of the Secretary of Homeland Security and *limits* judicial review of those decisions. The Court further concluded that challengers of this ruling are unlikely to prevail on their claim that Haiti's TPS designation was terminated in violation of the Constitution's guarantee of equal protection because it was motivated by race.

What Does This Mean?

This decision does **not** decide what will happen in each person's immigration case. If you are a TPS holder, watch for updates from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), and talk to a licensed immigration attorney or accredited legal representative if you have questions about your options. Our office cannot give legal advice or tell you what immigration choice is best for you.

- DHS may resume their efforts of ending TPS for Haiti.
- Some people with TPS may lose their protection if they do not have or are not eligible for another legal immigration status.
- DHS and USCIS will share updates about what will happen next.

Every case is different. A lawyer or accredited legal representative can explain your options.

What Does This Not Mean?

- ✗ It does **NOT** mean everyone in the United States under Haitian TPS must leave the United States right away.
- ✗ It does **NOT** mean every person's immigration status ends immediately.
- ✗ It is **NOT** a deportation order.
